# Inner City Rough Sleeper Street Count May 2010

The seventh Inner City Rough Sleeper Street Count was conducted on 4 May 2010. The Count located 52 adults who were unsheltered or 'sleeping rough'.

The 'Rough Sleeper Street Counts' aim to monitor levels of homelessness in the Adelaide inner city area as well as provide information about the circumstances and profile of the population. Previous Counts were conducted on 19 June and 21 August 2007; 13 May and 12 August 2008; and 5 May and 11 August 2009. The Counts are a partnership between the Department for Families and Communities, the Social Inclusion Unit (Department of the Premier and Cabinet) and key homeless services in the inner city: Street to Home, Byron Place Day Centre, Westcare Day Centre and Hutt Street Day Centre.

The data reported in this Bulletin was collected in the morning or early afternoon of 4 May (see Appendix for questionnaire). In the early morning, Street to Home visited the parklands and other areas around the city in order to locate people 'sleeping rough'. The three Day Centres also approached people attending their services that day and invited their participation in completing a short survey. The methodology for the Count was very similar to that used by the ABS in the 2006 Census (ie the same agencies were involved in the collection of data and similar collection strategies were used).

# Accommodation of all participants

Collectors completed 282 surveys on 4 May 2010. Matching of identifiers and other information indicated that four people completed the survey twice. The first and repeated surveys from those four people were combined into one record. Therefore, it is considered that a total of 278 individuals were in contact with participating services on the day of the Count. Of these, 52 reported they had slept the night before in *unsheltered* circumstances and 99 were in *other accommodation*<sup>1</sup> (Table 1). Given the focus on people who are 'sleeping rough' or marginally housed, analysis in this report excludes the 95 people currently living in their own home and the 32 who declined to participate in the survey (whose housing status was *unknown*).

1 Other accommodation includes a range of short-stay arrangements, e.g. boarding house, temporarily living at a friend's or relative's house, SAAP accommodation, backpackers, hotel/motel, city watchhouse, prison, remand centre, hospital, detox/sobering up unit, caravan park, and other sheltered facilities.



#### **Trends**

A higher number of people were in contact with the participating services in the current Count than the two previous Counts (Figure 1). Compared with the August 2009 Count, the current Count identified a slight rise in numbers of *unsheltered*. This is likely to be a direct consequence of the reduced number of participants with '*unknown*' accommodation status. (In the August 09 Count, difficulties in rostering on survey collectors at one service led to higher numbers of incomplete surveys which were classified as '*unknown accommodation*'. This is likely to have contributed to a lower rate of *unsheltered* respondents at the time).

Over the seven Counts, the numbers of people in *other accommodation* has remained relatively stable.

#### **Current accommodation**

Most commonly, those who were *unsheltered* were staying in the streets or the parklands (71.2%), with all but four in the Adelaide city area (Table 2 and Table 3). The category of *'other accommodation'* includes a range of short-stay arrangements, the majority of which could be categorized as secondary or tertiary homelessness. Most respondents in this group were in boarding houses.

# Recent housing history

Participants were asked how long they had been staying in the accommodation they used on the previous night (Table 4 and Table 5). The median length of stay for the *unsheltered* was 13 weeks, ranging from one night to 25 years (for one person). For those in *other accommodation*, the median was 9 weeks, with a range from one night to 20 years (for one man in a boarding house).

To provide an indication of recent housing history, respondents were asked to indicate where else they had been staying in the past twelve months<sup>2</sup>. Of those who were *unsheltered*, 8 (15%) reported they had been in their own house or flat for some period (compared with 18 (18%) in *other accommodation*) (Table 6). Slightly less than 30% of respondents in *other accommodation* had 'slept rough' at some time in the past twelve months.

<sup>3</sup> It should be noted that only moves <u>between</u>, rather than <u>within</u> accommodation types, were recorded, which means an undercount of moves is likely. For example, an individual could have moved between different boarding houses, but only one accommodation type (boarding house) was recorded.

Over half of those who were *unsheltered* reported having used another type of accommodation (i.e. aside from *unsheltered*) in the last twelve months, compared to around 70% of those in *other accommodation* (Table 7). Overall, *unsheltered* respondents had used fewer forms of accommodation than those in *other accommodation*.

In terms of the accommodation in which they spent most time in the past year, just over 25% of respondents reported having spent most time as *unsheltered* (Table 8).

Respondents had usually spent most of the last twelve months in the Adelaide metropolitan area (Table 9). Of the 18 who had been mostly inter-state, 8 were from the Northern Territory and 5 were from New South Wales (Table 10). Four Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander participants had been mostly interstate in the last twelve months, 3 in the Northern Territory and 1 in New South Wales. Two participants reported spending most of the last year in other countries (one currently living in a car had spent most time in Germany; another currently in St Vincent de Paul Shelter had spent most time in New Zealand).

# **Demographics**

There were 20 women recorded in the Count (13%), seven of whom were *unsheltered* (Table 11 and Table 12).

Whilst most respondents were aged between 35 and 64 years, 10 (6 *unsheltered* and 4 in *other accommodation*) were under 25 years old (7%), and 10 (in *other accommodation*) were aged over 65 years (7%).

Twenty-five Aboriginal participants were recorded (17%), 8 of whom were unsheltered.

# Children

One survey form reported an *unsheltered* respondent with a child currently living with them. However, this information was inconsistent with other responses on the form and appears to be a data entry error. Another respondent (living in a domestic violence family shelter) also reported a young child in their care.

#### Multiple service usage

Around 30% of *unsheltered* respondents (n=16) and 35% of those in *other accommodation* (n=35) reported they had used or intended to use another inner city service(s) on the day of the Count. Westcare Day Centre was the service most frequently cited.

#### Individual identifiers

As in previous Counts, all respondents were asked if they were willing to have an individual identifier recorded on the form (initials; month and year of birth; gender). 202 respondents (72.7%) (including those in their own homes) provided this information (Table 13). Of these, 41 (or 20.3%) were currently *unsheltered* and 79 (39.1%) were in *other accommodation*. Slightly less than 80% of respondents in both unsheltered circumstances and *other accommodation* groups provided identifiers.

Of the 151 people who were *unsheltered* or in *other accommodation*, 34 (or 22.5%) had participated in at least one previous Count. Across the total 278 respondents, only one had participated in all six Counts. This person was *unsheltered* in August 2007, in *other accommodation* in other Counts and in May 2010 was living in their own home.
