

INNER CITY HOMELESS COUNT MAY 2008 SUMMARY OF RESULTS

1. Background

The ABS Homelessness Enumeration Strategy is exceptional in the quality of data it produces and the extent and depth of its coverage. Unfortunately, however, new data is only available every 5 years, with a considerable lag between data collection and release. This is an acute issue in South Australia, where the government has identified reducing homelessness as a key social policy goal - the South Australian Strategic Plan has a specific target of halving the number of people sleeping rough by 2010. Additional approaches are therefore needed to collect more regular and 'up to the minute' information on homelessness numbers, especially in key areas such as the inner city.

In 2007 a strategy was devised to conduct a twice annual count of homeless people in the City of Adelaide. This is being done as a collaborative project between state government and key inner city homelessness services.

Two surveys were conducted in 2007 (on 19th June and 21st August). The first count for 2008 was conducted on 13th May. This Report tables the results of these counts and highlights areas where change has occurred.

2. Method

The third Inner City Homeless Count was conducted on 13th May 2008. Collection was undertaken by and through four agencies: Street to Home; Byron Place Day Centre; Westcare; and Hutt Street Day Centre.

In the early morning on the day of the Count, Street to Home visited the Parklands and other locations known to be frequented by people sleeping in unsheltered accommodation. Day Centres approached all people attending their service and invited their participation in the survey. All collection was undertaken in the morning or early afternoon.

The questionnaire (see appendix) was amended slightly from the June and August 2007 surveys based on feedback from agencies and to obtain more specific information on the state of origin and accommodation status over the past 12 months.

The methodology for the count was very similar to that used by the ABS in the 2006 Census (ie, the same agencies were involved in the collection of data and similar collection strategies were used). However, the ABS count occurred over 3 days. The ABS Census Short Form (specifically targeted at 'rough sleepers') was modified to fit the specific purposes of this Count (for example, to provide more information on housing history and less information on demographic characteristics such as marital status and income).

3. Total Numbers

On the 13th May 2008 a total of 347 surveys were completed by the 4 agencies. Matching of identifiers and other information indicated that 5 people completed the survey twice. The first and repeated surveys from those 5 people were then combined into one record. Therefore, it is considered that a total **342 individuals**¹ were in contact with the designated agencies on the day of the count (compared to **362** individuals, 365 survey forms in August; **357 individuals** from 362 surveys in June).

This decline in overall numbers was reflected in decreased numbers in all accommodation types. The greatest fall was in those who were *homeless unsheltered* – a decline of 27% from the June 2007 count.




Figure 1: Type of current shelter on day of count

The number of people who declined to participate or were too incapacitated to respond increased to 87 (25.4%) (compared to June 56, 15.7% and August 66, 18.2%) (Table 1, Figure 1). Accommodation status and other circumstances of this group are unknown and therefore no attempt has been made to allocate them into accommodation categories.

¹ Note that there may have been less individuals due to potential 'double counting' in the non-participant group (ie identifiers and other information were not recorded, but the same individuals could have been recorded more than once in different services on the same day as 'refused').

4. Type and location of accommodation

Across the three surveys, the majority of respondents have been living in a variety of accommodation in the area covered by the City of Adelaide.




Figure 2: Type of current shelter for people in Homeless - Unsheltered accommodation

Most of those in unsheltered circumstances, in all three surveys, have been staying in the streets or parks in the Adelaide City area. The proportion in other forms of unsheltered circumstances was lower in the May survey than the 2007 surveys (see Table A - 1 in Appendix, Table 2 and Figure 2).

The category of *other accommodation* includes a range of short-stay options, the majority of which would be categorised as either secondary or tertiary homelessness or marginal housing. In all three surveys, those in *other accommodation* were most likely to be residing in the Adelaide City area (75% in May), although to a lesser extent than the *unsheltered* group. Boarding houses have been the most common housing form for this group in all the surveys (43% of May respondents, Table 3).

The May count saw an increase in numbers in *sobering up/ detox* and a decrease in those in a hotel/ motel and staying temporarily with friends or relatives (Table 3).




Figure 3: Location of current shelter (all groups)

In all three surveys, the majority of those in their own homes were living in the suburbs (53% in May) Figure 3 and Table A - 2 in Appendix).

4. Recent housing history




Figure 4: Distribution of how long staying in their accommodation (Homeless unsheltered)

Respondents were asked how long they had been staying in their current accommodation (Table A - 3 and Figure 4). They were also asked to indicate where else they had been staying in the past 12 months. Together these responses provide an indication of recent housing history and transience/stability.²

In all three surveys, those in *unsheltered accommodation* and *other accommodation* have given responses which indicate high levels of housing instability and homelessness. The median length of stay in current accommodation is quite short for both groups (Table 4). Both groups also indicate using a variety of accommodation types over the past year (Table 5). Those in *other accommodation* tend to

indicate use of a greater number of accommodation types, perhaps indicative of transience and shortstay as well as the insecurity and vulnerability of these housing types.³

The median length of stay for the *homeless – unsheltered*' group in the May 2008 survey was 14 weeks with one respondent stating they had been unsheltered for 25 years (Table 4, Figure 4). The proportion who reported being unsheltered for less than three months fell from a high in August (56%) to 42%. 34% of those currently unsheltered indicated that they had stayed temporarily with friends or relatives during the year – the most common housing option (Table A - 3). Only 12.6% indicated they had been in some form of SAAP accommodation in the last 12 months. 8.8% indicated they had been in prison, and only a relatively small proportion – 10% - had been in their own home/flat.

The median length of stay in current accommodation for the 'other accommodation' group was only four weeks in May, with 58% in their current accommodation for less than three months (Table 4 and Table A - 3). In all three surveys, relatively similar proportions of this group indicated they had spent time in primary homelessness throughout the year (39% in June and August; 37% May). A minority had been in their own home or flat (17% June; 22% August; 16% May). The use of SAAP accommodation was slightly higher for this group (compared to the currently unsheltered) but still a minority option (15% June; 10% August; 22% May). 8.6% in the May survey indicated they had been in prison at some time in the year (cf. 10% June and 3.6% August).

The longest period in accommodation for those living in their own home was 30 years (compared with 39 years in August and 29 years in June). The median for this group was 3 years, with 30% living in their current home for less than a year (Table 4, A - 5).

A third of respondents in all surveys had experienced primary homelessness at some stage during the past twelve months (Table A - 6).

 $^{^{3}}$ It should be noted that only moves between housing types, rather than within housing types, is recorded, which means an undercount of moves. For example, an individual could have moved between a number of different boarding houses, but only one accommodation type – a boarding house – will be recorded.

5. Demographic information

Respondents' ages are summarised in Table 7 and additional demographics in Table A - 4.

In the first two surveys, the age profile of the *unsheltered* group and those in *other accommodation* was identical, and younger than those in their *own home*. In the May survey, however, the median age of the *unsheltered* group fell (to 36 years, cf. with 40 years in both June and August); whilst the median age of those in *other accommodation* rose slightly (42 years May, cf. to 40 years in both June and August). The median age for those in their own home remained stable, across all three surveys, at 48 years.

Particular concern is warranted with regards to both younger (under 25 years) and older (over 65 years) participants in the surveys, especially those who were *unsheltered* or in *other accommodation*. Small proportions of younger people were recorded in all three surveys, with a drop in May (6.4% June; 6.3%, August 3.5% May). Three young people were unsheltered in May, with another two in other accommodation.

In all three surveys, those aged 65 years or older were generally in their own home. No older people were unsheltered in May.



In all surveys, the great majority of participants were born in Australia, non-indigenous, single and male (Table A - 4). Those born outside Australia were more likely, in each survey, to be in their own home (for example, 28% of those in their own home in the May survey were not born in Australia, compared to only 9% of those who were unsheltered). Observations made during the data collection process suggest one reason for this pattern being people attending Day Centres for services (such as Centrelink assistance for recently arrived refugees).

Aboriginal people have been over-represented in all groups, in all three surveys, but particularly those in u*nsheltered* accommodation (Table A - 4). This over-representation was extremely high in the May count (38%, or 30 people, compared to 30% June and 27% August) (Figure 5, Table 7: Cultural background by sex, unsheltered group, May 2008Table 7).






In all surveys, approximately 80% of participants have been male, with this representation reflected (with minor variations) across all accommodation groups (Figure 6). However, there was a substantial increase in the May survey in the proportion of women in the *unsheltered* group (28 women – 37%). These women were primarily Aboriginal (21 of the 28) (Table 7). 70% of the Aboriginal people in the *unsheltered* group were women.

The August 2007 and May 2008 surveys collected improved information on children currently living with respondents (Table 8). In the August count, 13 respondents had reported children living with them (none of whom were unsheltered). This number fell to nine in May. Two of these respondents (with four children in total) were currently *unsheltered*. One family was reported to be living in a squat and the other in the Parklands. This is the first time *unsheltered* children were identified in the counts.

Between them, the 9 adults had 20 children living with them, with 15 children twelve years or under. Those in *other accommodation* were in SAAP accommodation and staying temporarily with friends or relatives.

6. Location over past twelve months

In all three surveys, approximately 3% of respondents have reported spending most of the past 12 months in regional SA (Table 9). Higher proportions reported coming from interstate (12.6% June; 10.2% August and 5.8% May). The interstate group have tended to be over-represented amongst the *unsheltered* population (18.5% June; 22.5% August). However, in the May count only 7 of the *unsheltered* (8.8%) came from inter-state. For the first time, the May survey collected information about which state respondents had predominantly resided. Responses indicated seven people from Queensland, five from NSW and four from WA.

7. Use of other Inner City Services

Participants were asked if they intended to use another inner city service on the day of the count. Generally, respondents have indicated that they will only use one service. The May count saw a drop in those who intended to use more than one service (22% May cf. to 28% August, 30% June). In all counts, the Westcare Day Centre has been the service most commonly indicated, probably reflecting the intention of people at Byron Place to attend Westcare for a meal (Table 10).

Only a very small proportion of people intended to use more than one service (7 respondents, 2% in May cf. to 13, (4%) in August) (Table 11).

8. Individual identifier

In all surveys, participants have been asked if they were willing to provide an individual identifier (first name and last name initials and month and year of birth) 192 people (56%) provided an identifier in May, a decrease compared to both August (261 people, 72%) and June 2007 (265, 74%). Of those who gave identifiers, 9 people participated in all surveys, with an additional 77 present in two (Table 12).
